ADDRESSING DIGNIFIED WORK IN CAREER GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING

October 17, 2024, 3:15-6:00 p.m. (CEST)

The 4th ESVDC webinar aims to pursue the critical perspective that characterized its first, second, and third editions, which addressed Next Generation EU, migration challenges, and advocacy counseling, respectively.

The notion of dignity, broadly defined as "our inherent value and worth"¹, is increasingly referred to as a purpose of career guidance and counseling (CGC). Intuitively, promoting dignity in and at work² suggests more ambitious goals than simply providing access to decent work. The idea underlying the promotion of dignified work is that, in addition to decent working conditions, people can also aspire to access meaningful work³. While appealing and underpinning noble intentions, this concept remains poorly circumscribed and operationalized in our field. Yet, to truly promote dignified work, it is essential to clearly define what it is, how to address it, and what its components and characteristics are. International scholars will tackle this challenge by addressing the following questions:

- What is dignified work?
- How can it be addressed in career development research?
- To what extent can the concept of dignified work be useful and used in CGC?
